SHRF - Activities:

The Geebung Museum and the Coolum Showroom continue with normal activities consistent with all "COVID Safe" requirements under QLD Government regulation. The easing of the "lockdown" in Victoria has meant that the BAH volunteer group has been able to resume work. However, general activities at both BAH and LGSI remain on-hold in line with Victorian Government regulations limiting the number of people allowed to gather inside a building.

Geebung Museum:

The Geebung Museum has received an interesting car for display, on loan from R & T Forno. It is a 1968 Volvo 145S Station Wagon with an unusual history.

The car was sold new to Major Kenneth H Barnes of Silver Springs, Maryland, USA by Aktiebolaget Volvo of Gothenburg, Sweden.

Geebung Museum Curator, Barry Sparks advises that "it is believed Major Barnes was with SAS at the time of delivery. The colours of green with a white roof (colours used by the Defence Forces) leads us to believe this is in fact an ex-SAS vehicle. A sticker on the back Window adds to this belief." Interestingly, AB Volvo is the parent company and not a retail dealer. This may well reinforce the view that the Volvo was sold in unusual circumstances.

In recent months there have been some interesting donations to the Geebung Museum. Ian Warnett donated the book "Sectional Drawings – Piston Aero Engines" by Lyndon Jones. Published by the Rolls-Royce Heritage Trust (UK) this is a work of art with incredibly detailed drawings of a wide range of historic aero engines. Margaret and Barrie Gillings (NSW Branch) donated books relating to the Silver Ghost. John Miles donated some Jaguar Mk IV hand tools, now on display in the Technical Room. David Ford donated an early Silver

We are receiving excellent feedback on our display of six Rolls-Royce engines, The Foundation's "Royal" Phantom V and the cars displayed on loan from local enthusiasts.

The most recent addition to the Showroom is a Rolls-Royce "Avon" Mark 26 aero engine on long-term loan from The Queensland Aircraft Museum, Caloundra. Manufactured at the Commonwealth Aircraft Corporation plant in Melbourne, under licence from Rolls-Royce Limited, this is an historic reminder of the strength of the Australian aviation industry in the 1950s
